programme - the Pod Coming up this November and through to January 2018, the Pod has a number of exciting activities for schools to take part in:

Switch Off Fortnight 2017Starting on 20th November – 3rd December, Switch Off Fortnight is the Pod's nationwide energy saving campaign for schools. There are a range of curriculum-linked resources and free campaign packs on the Pod, to help get the whole school involved and focussed on how to use energy more efficiently.

Waste Week 2018 Schools can sign up now to take part in Waste Week which will run between the 5 – 9th March. The campaign focus next year is food and packaging waste, and there will be a whole menu of Pod resources and free campaign packs for schools, to support the message of 'reduce, reuse, recycle.'

What's Under Your Feet Together with the British Trust for Ornithology, we are asking schools to take part in an exciting citizen science experiment which involves digging up soil and investigating what's underneath! The activity is designed to help scientists at the BTO understand the relationship between climate, the availability of invertebrates and how this impacts UK bird numbers. The next dig takes place in March, but schools can sign up at any time and will be credited in a scientific paper for taking part.
